Update from the Executive Director

Kia ora!

This newsletter was finalised last night, but lo and behold have been significant tariff updates this morning. The US Court of International Trade earlier ruled that the President had exceeded his authority in imposing the Liberation Day tariffs and ordered an immediate halt to them. However, a federal appeals court has now ruled to reinstate the tariffs temporarily, pending an appeal hearing by the Trump Administration. Our understanding is that the tariffs imposed by President Trump on New Zealand products are still in place, and we will keep you updated as we know more. The tariff news included in the Trade and Policy Update below is up to date to the 29th May.

Export Awards season is well and truly underway! Next Friday we will be celebrating the Central Region Export Awards in Palmerston North, while the finalists for the Bay of Plenty Awards https://doi.org/10.25 Awards https://doi.org/10.25 Awards are closing on the 19th June! Thanks to our Network partners, Business Central and the EMA for their work putting these awards together, and to ASB Bank for their support with all three awards.

Certain export sectors had wins in the budget; the big win for exporters overall is the investment boost scheme. Exporters and manufacturers have long called for an accumulated depreciation-type arrangement to help with investment in new plant and equipment, so we are very supportive of the announcement. Last but not least, keep an eye out for our ExportNZ DHL Barometer Survey going out early next week. This is the one and only survey ExportNZ conducts and helps us continue to advocate on behalf of the sector. It'll take less than 10 minutes to complete, so please help us out!

Why premium still wins in China

Much has been written about China's "consumption downgrade" and "deflationary pressures." It is true that China hasn't experienced significant inflation like in the West – average sales prices have remained flat, and prices in some sub-categories have even declined. Chinese consumers are also becoming more price-conscious, moving on from the days when buying the most expensive product was equated with buying the best. But just looking at the headlines around price drops only tells half the story.
